

Introduction

Looking back on 2018, in accordance with the *Law on the Administration of the Activities of Overseas Non-Governmental Organizations in the People's Republic of China*, World Vision successfully registered the Shaanxi Representative Office and the Hebei Representative Office. Together with the six representative offices registered in 2017, World Vision has successfully registered eight representative offices in China.

In the past year, World Vision continued to serve vulnerable children in rural and urban areas, and seized every opportunity to play the role of an international institution, sharing its project experience in China with international friends and peers.

In July 2018, World Vision, together with the delegations of China Foundation for Poverty Alleviation, participated in the 8th Asian Ministerial Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction (AMCDRR) co-sponsored by the Mongolian government and the United Nations International Strategy for Disaster Reduction (UNISDR). World Vision shared at the meeting how the *Teacher's Toolkit on Safety Education* is being used and shared among the countries in Asia.

In November 2018, World Vision officially launched the "It takes a World to End Violence Against Children". In the next five years, we will work closely with partners and governments to strengthen the capacity of the communities and caregivers for positive discipline and family education. We will also help teenagers and children to enhance their self-protection awareness and resilience through education on life skills. We will also allocate more resources to our child protection programs, at the same time strengthen the skills and knowledge of our staff. Through the full implementation of child protection standards, World Vision will become a better child protection institution.

Lastly, I have to thank the continuous support from our sponsors, donors and partners; the relentless effort of our staff. These all contribute to our successfully changing the lives of many children in different parts of China.


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World Vision

World Vision China

In 1993, World Vision China was established to carry out a wide variety of work on poverty alleviation and community development. All World Vision China projects are initiated through close partnership with local governments at all levels and received their full support. World Vision China also works with non-governmental organizations (NGOs), academic institutions and local villagers in project areas to help poor communities break away from poverty and achieve sustainable development. As a result of such close partnerships and collaboration in the past decades, World Vision China has not only won respect from local communities, but also established good relations with government counterparts and other NGOs.

In 2018, World Vision China operated **29** Child-focused Area Programs that directly benefited  **60,687** sponsored children, let children living out lives of fullness and served  **2,574,089** people in China.

Since the *Law on Administration of Activities of Overseas Non-governmental Organizations* in the Mainland China went into effect on January 1, 2017, World Vision has completed registration of 8 representative offices in Guangdong, Yunnan, Guizhou, Jiangxi, Tianjin, Guangxi, Shaanxi and Hebei. In 2018, our total expenditure is RMB **110,862,105** (USD **16.19** million) for projects.



Our Achievements in 2018



Child Protection

Supported the operation of the child protection system in rural and urban areas to identify, refer and serve the children, including children in a dilemma, in the community:

- Supported the operation of the  118 Children's Center, provided children with safe space for activities, and taught them self-protection knowledge such as life skills
- Improved the quality of the service in the Children's Center and conducted various types of training for  6,300 workers of the Children's Center
- Supported child participation, and carried out child protection from the perspective of children, benefited over  61,800 people



Education and Life Skills

- Supported the environment improvement in rural and urban areas, benefited  41 schools and  51,000 children
- Provided life skills education to the children and supported them to rise to the social and self-protection challenges arising during their growth, benefited  20,700 children and teenagers
- Reading promotion activities, benefited over  22,000 children



Disaster Relief & Rehabilitation

- Disaster Prevention and Reduction Activities: over  7,600 beneficiaries
- Rehabilitation: over  3,900 beneficiaries
- Total Input: USD 155,635

Health

Child nutrition:

- Implemented the health education in exclusive breastfeeding and complementary feeding in rural communities, which benefited over 270 mothers or caregivers of children under 2 years old and 1,100 community members

Child health, and water, environmental sanitation and personal hygiene:

- Implemented health education in handwashing and common childhood illness management (diarrhoea and pneumonia), benefited 4,500 children
- Constructed rural primary school sanitary toilets, benefited 995 children
- Constructed drinking water systems and facilities, benefited over 5,000 people

Child injury:

- 67 communities participated to improve the environmental hazards that caused child injuries
- Implemented the health education in child injuries including road traffic injuries, drowning and falls, benefited over 2,600 children



Resilience & Sustainable Livelihood

- Training for economic income creation / ecological agriculture, benefited over 3,500 people
- Environmental protection activities (tree planting / methane-generating pit / solar energy / knowledge publicity, etc.), benefited over 9,300 people
- Community and school disaster drills, benefited over 15,000 people



Multi-Level Partnerships

Environmental Sanitation in Beautiful Community and Child Health Promotion

In March 2018, a conclusion meeting was held in Kunming for the “Yunnan ethnic minority areas community and school water, sanitation and hygiene-research and promotion project”. The project was a cooperation between the Chinese Center for Disease Control and Prevention Rural Water Technical Guidance Center (RWTGC) and World Vision China. The survey was jointly conducted by experts of the RWTGC, Yunnan Provincial CDC and County CDC of four World Vision project counties (Honghe, Luchun, Yuanyang, Yuanmou). The research result had enabled a better understanding of current situation of drinking water, rural toilets and environmental sanitation in the communities and schools. The findings also included factors influencing health behaviors in relation to children's health. These information provides important basis for discussing the implementation approaches for the current policies on rural environmental hygiene and harmless toilets.

In July 2018, the “ Beautiful Environment and Sanitation for Children's Health Project ” was kick-started in Yunnan. This is a multi-level partnership project of the Chinese CDC Rural Water Technical Guidance Center, Yunnan Provincial CDC and World Vision, and is being implemented in World Vision Yuanmou and Honghe project sites. The aim is to pilot the implementation method for the “ Three-year Action Plan for Rural Human Habitat Improvement ” in poor rural villages of Yunnan Province. The contents include adaptation of the provincial standard of sanitary and harmless toilets in rural schools and communities. Health education and promotion approach centers on toilets and health, and is child-focused. Communities and schools participate and implement environmental hygiene and child health education and behavioral change communications activities.

Sanitary toilet is the cornerstone of ensuring clean drinking water, environmental sanitation and children's health rights in the rural areas.

International and Domestic Exchanges to Promote Experience Sharing in Disaster Prevention and Mitigation

The 8th Asian Ministerial Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction (AMCDRR), co-sponsored by the Mongolian government and the United Nations International Strategy for Disaster Reduction (UNISDR), opened on the afternoon of July 3, 2018 in the National Palace of Ulaanbaatar, the capital of Mongolia. More than 3,000 people from about 50 countries and regions, international organizations, non-governmental organizations, scientific research institutions, and enterprises attended the conference.

On behalf of the Chinese government, Dr. Zheng Guoguang, Vice Minister of the Ministry of Emergency Management of the People's Republic of China and Director of the China Earthquake Administration, attended the conference with over 20 Chinese delegations. The World Vision had 15 representatives from the national offices in six countries participating in more than 20 sessions. Each country shared the results and experience of disaster prevention and mitigation work in the local areas. World Vision China, together with the delegations from the China Foundation for Poverty Alleviation, participated in the sessions.

Ms. Leung Huimei, Regional Humanitarian Emergency Affairs Director of World Vision East Asia, shared the results of the *AMCDRR Children and Youth Survey Report 2018* and appealed for the government and society to give children more opportunities to participate in disaster prevention and mitigation activities, learnings and drills.





Multi-Level Partnerships

Working Hand in Hand with Partners on Child Protection



The teacher training session on “ Love Life Sexual Health Education Course ”.

World Vision cooperated with the research group on child sexual health education of Beijing Normal University and the project school to develop a “ Love Life Sexual Health Education Course ” for children. Up to now, more than 3,000 children and over 100 teachers have benefited from the course. The course centered on child sexual health education, so that children can correctly understand themselves and others, learn to communicate, know how to protect themselves, and become more independent individuals.

“Yunnan Anti-Domestic Violence Network”, initiated by the Center for Rights Protection Service of Yunnan Women's Federation and jointly participated by 12 institutions including the Yunnan Representative Office of World Vision, Save the Children, and the Children Rescue Service Center of Jiixin Community in Yunnan Province, was formally established in Kunming. The network will tackle domestic violence problems including improper discipline like corporal punishment for children.

World Vision cooperated with the Research Center for Family and School Cooperative Education of Northeast Normal University to provide four-time family education pilot training for the front-line workers of Hepingzhijun Social Work Service Center in Wuqing District, Tianjin City. The community-oriented family education courses helped parents understand the characteristics and growth needs of their children at different ages, and taught them to adopt appropriate positive discipline methods, so as to establish a good parent-child relationship and create a safe and warm environment for children growth.

It takes a world to end violence against children global campaign

Every year, violence affects around 1.7 billion children in every country, city and community. The life of every child is precious. As the member of the Global Partnership to End Violence Against Children initiated by United Nations, World Vision launches a campaign, **It takes a world to end violence against children**, the joint movements of people in 85 countries and regions committed to listening to the voices of children and youth, keeping children safe from harm, and bringing about positive changes to the lives of vulnerable children, directly contributing to Sustainable Development Goals of UN.

In China, World Vision focuses on **ending domestic violence against children, with the goal that girls and boys in China are protected from Domestic Violence and thrive in a positive and caring environment**. Some statistics show 24.7%¹ of families experience domestic violence to various degrees while women and children are the main victims. Domestic violence against children can be hardly detected, so it takes a world, all walks of life, to make effort. In the following five years, World Vision will support in ending domestic violence against children in the following five aspects:

Community members and parents/caregivers' behaviour demonstrate the capacity to protect children from Domestic Violence.



Children and youth have the capacity and resilience to protect themselves and their peers from Domestic Violence, and enter dialogue with influencers and decision makers.



Laws and Policies in China, relating to Domestic Violence, are implemented through effective Child Protection mechanisms at different levels.



World Vision China achieves increased resources and visibility to take action addressing Domestic Violence.



World Vision China staff have the competencies (knowledge, attitude and skills) to implement the campaign to end Domestic Violence effectively.

Education Activities Themed on “Dear Family”

The child centers in urban and rural communities are not only important platforms for child protection but also key media for the guidance on family relationships. Since 2016, World Vision has relied on child centers and other platforms to launch “Dear Family Education Activities” and “Dear Family - Fun Box Game Day” at the project sites. Through experiential teaching methods, both children and parents learned how to communicate with each other positively in the game.



Children and parents were playing (massage) games in the Fun Box activities. The parents realized, **“I want to spend more time with my children, since their growth process is so short.”**



Children and parents were playing the “Eagle Catching Chicken” game together in the Fun Box activities. The parents said, **“I will be more patient with my children in the future.”**



In the community dialogue, the parents said, **“After hearing the voice of the children, I realize that corporal punishment isn’t the way to discipline the children. I hope to have more guidance for family education.”**

Children's Voice: In the face of domestic violence, we need the help from adults

At the first **Children's Forum** themed on **"Listen to Children, Work Together to Help Them"** which was held in Wuqing District, Tianjin City, 25 children bravely voiced their thoughts in front of the government officials, school teachers, social organizations, psychological counseling experts, legal counsels, and the parents in the community. They summed up "the most serious problems that they are most afraid of, and have the greatest impact on them", one of which is "Domestic Violence".

Through the self-organized and arranged story themed on "Domestic Violence", the children vividly expressed their inner voices and thoughts to the present adults, and bravely raised questions and suggestions to the leaders of relevant government authorities.



The **Remorseful Father** was a story with the theme of domestic violence and the parent-child relationship. The performance of children was really touching. **"Dad and mom, don't beat us. Please communicate with us more, accompany us more, and take care of us."**



The children shared the proposal and handed it to the government officials. **"I hope that the Women's Federation can promote anti-domestic violence often and teach parents the discipline skills, so that our relationship can be more harmonious."**



"Not to resort to violence while dealing with parent-child relationships. We must use the empathy method to think from the perspective of our children and reflect on the ways we respond." The present adults responded to the needs of children and proposed some suggestions.

Embrace love, and say BYE to violence

From June 1 to 2, World Vision China joined hands with Guangzhou Parc Central to launch a public welfare carnival, with the support from Vision Love Foundation, Starbucks, Faber-Castell and other organizations. Children learned how to address violence by drawing and games and began to pay attention to the violence with their parents. Alex FONG, ambassador of Ending Violence Against Children, was present to interact with children and called on the public to focus on the problem of violence against children and to strengthen the protection of children.

Alex Fong, an artist from Hong Kong, **“The activity is very meaningful. It teaches the children to ‘say no to violence’. I’m an adult now, but I used to be a child. I’m very grateful that I didn’t have any unpleasant experiences when I was a child, so that I could grow up safe and sound. I hope that everyone can work together to reduce or even eliminate the possibilities of those unfortunate experiences happening to children.”**

"Anti-Domestic Violence" Training Successfully Held

Strengthening the relevant knowledge and ability of social organizations can promote the implementation of the *Anti-Domestic Violence Law* and help prevent and address the domestic violence. In June and August 2018, World Vision China successfully supported the **Anti-Domestic Violence Case Management Capacity Building and Multi-Sectoral Cooperation Experience Promotion Training** twice in Shenzhen City. This activity was hosted by the Institute of Psychology of Chinese Academy of Sciences and organized by Shenzhen Pengxing Anti-Domestic Violence Center. In total 259 government officials and members of civil society organizations engaged in anti-domestic violence participated in. Meanwhile, *Anti-Domestic Violence Workbook* and *Anti-Domestic Violence Case Management Workbook* were released to support the standardization and specialization of service of social organizations.

Participant's Words:

- *I have new recognition about knowledge of anti-domestic violence and multi-organization cooperation which help me to take operation better in my position.*
- *I've learnt what's the line between domestic violence and family issue, and how could I serve the client better when related to domestic violent case.*
- *The training help us to connect resources together. Excellent!*

Trainers' Words:

- *In the area of anti-domestic violence, as well as various social work area, case management training is in great need. Therefore, it is rare, unique, and necessary for us to hold such a specific training.*



Globally up to 1 billion children have experienced physical, sexual and psychological violence in the past year.
