FOREWORD

Recently on a hiking trip with some friends, we came across a path which was not marked on the map. There were no road signs and the path ahead was covered with tall grass. Fortunately, a group of hikers passed by. They evidently had more experience with the area and told us to just look out for ribbons that act as trail markers, and follow the trail cables. Long story short, we were all relieved when we found our way back to the main hiking path that day.

The hike reminds me of World Vision China's journey this year. We began with much anticipation, but we also knew the path ahead would be challenging. This year marks the beginning of a new five-year national strategy. We had our target in sight but reaching it would require strong team work, courage to take on new challenges and humility to seek help when we need it. During the first half of the year, we underwent an organizational restructuring so that we could be more agile to effectively serve the children and communities in need, despite reduced resources and constraints posed by the pandemic.

2021 is also the 30th anniversary of the *Law of the People's Republic of China on the Protection of Minors*. On 1 June, amendments were passed which aims at better protecting children at school, at home, in public and online. The revised Law clearly outlines the responsibilities and roles of the state, government departments, schools, families and organizations that work closely with minors in safeguarding the well-being of children. Meanwhile, the government is also moving ahead with its rural revitalization plans and reduce the development gaps between urban and rural regions. In our commitment to serve the most vulnerable children, World Vision continues to align our work with the government's policies, so that we can achieve greater impact and sustainable development in the communities we work with.

I want to thank our team, who remains steadfast this their call to serve vulnerable children in China. There were times when we walked into situations we were not familiar with, areas that were not marked on the map. When no trail markers were in sight, our team used their innovation and resourcefulness. When at times the path ahead looked daunting and uncertain, our team remained faithful and determined. It is because of their dedication that many children are able to embark on their own journey of hope.

Lastly, on behalf of World Vision, I want to express our heartfelt appreciation to our government supervisory units, other government and local partners, supporters and volunteers. You are fellow hikers in our journey, who have kindly offered your counsel, support and encouragement. It is because of your partnership that we are able to proudly share the accomplishments and milestones we had achieved this year. We are inspired by your generosity and grateful for the opportunity to serve alongside with you. Together, we are moving closer towards our vision - that every child may live life in all its fullness.

WORLD VISION CHINA

In 1982, World Vision joined the emergency relief work in response to the Qinghai flood disaster. With the support from the government, World Vision laid a good foundation in China and in 1993, World Vision China was established to carry out work in poverty alleviation and community development.

In accordance with the *Law of the People's Republic of China on the Administration of Activities of Overseas Non-Governmental Organizations within the Territory of China*, World Vision China has representative offices in Guangdong, Yunnan, Guizhou, Jiangxi, Tianjin, Guangxi, Shaanxi and Hebei. We continue to work closely with local governments, NGOs and communities to develop the well-being of children and bring hope to the most vulnerable children in China.

In 2021, our total expenditure was **CNY 83,553,543 (USD 12 million)**. We are supported by World Vision offices worldwide, with nearly 60% of funds raised via monthly donations from Hong Kong. World Vision is accountable to our donors through annual internal and external audits, and diligent selection of partners we work with.



Our Achievements in 2021 Child Protection and Development



Children are at the center of World Vision's work, and building a caring and nurturing environment is vital for their growth. As such, child protection and development has always been an area of our focus. World Vision promotes the protection of children and supports their growth and development by improving the facilities and environments in schools, communities and in families. We also equip parents and caregivers to be able to protect children, build social workers' child protection capacities, as well as equip children to protect themselves and to care for their peers.

To help migrant children who face additional challenges receiving education, protection and care from their families, World Vision has launched programs in Guangdong, Guangxi and Shaanxi where these children can learn self-protection and life-skills, and also support parents by helping them build stronger relationships with their children through family education.

In 2021, World Vision's Child Protection and Development projects impacted the lives of **218,900** people, including **8,800** migrant children and their caregivers.



Key Projects

- Reached **26,033** people through trainings and community awareness to improve child protection and supported children to develop life-skills
- Supported programs to protect and enhance the development of **18,056** pre-school children aged 0-5 years old
- Conducted life-skill trainings (including self-protection and capacity building) for **31,319** children
- Improved the facilities in schools and communities to better support child protection and development for **85,944** children

Story of change Kit's transformation

Several years ago, 13-year-old Kit, her younger brother and sister moved with their parents to a new place to live and study. As migrant children, they always felt a barriers existed between them and the community they lived in. When she first arrived in Guangzhou, Kit was a reserved and shy child.

To help Kit and other children like her have wholesome well-being and growth, World Vision works with local social organizations to run a Children Center in the community and conduct all kinds of activities to support these children and their parents.

At the Center, many children and their parents take part in activities during the weekends by joining DIY workshops, Guangzhou cultural tours, family activities and festival celebrations. In addition, children can also participate by becoming a volunteer and "little teacher" to lead other children in interesting activities.

Kit began to change when she took part in more and more activities. Her mother said, "Kit was such a reserved child, but she is so cheerful now. What a huge difference!" Not only has she become a volunteer to serve others, but she is also known for her workshops at the Center and school that teaches other children how to make healthy snacks.

After a few years of attending the Children Center, Kit and her family has transformed into a happier family. Her brother and sister have more friends to play with now. Her mother who attended several activities organized by the Center has acquired different skill sets to teach and effectively communicate with her children, and she has also made many new friends too.

Our Achievements in 2021

Health, Water and Sanitation



World Vision continues to improve sanitation facilities and promote hygiene behavior changes that help protect children, families and communities from diseases and infections, so that children can grow up healthier.

In 2021, World Vision's Health, Water and Sanitation projects have impacted the lives of **58,965** people through

1. Improved prevention of common childhood diseases and infections, and improved the care of children under-5
2. Improved prevention of common childhood diseases and infections for children in schools
3. Improved prevention of unintentional injuries for children

Key Projects

- Improved personal hygiene behaviors by conducting educational activities on handwashing and common childhood illnesses management for **1,602** people
- Provided **1,091** people access to clean drinking water by installing indoor drinking water systems
- Provided **706** people access to improved household sanitary toilets
- Carried out child injury prevention activities (especially about drowning, road traffic injuries and falls) for **10,689** people

I wish I could use clean tap water all the time!

12-year-old Yang studies in the same school as his younger sister. For this brother and sister duo, school life is challenging, "My school is near the top of a hill. Water cannot reach our school because there is not enough water pressure. Our teachers and students have to fetch water from a well" laments Yang. The well he is referring to is a kilometer away.

This has caused a lot of inconveniences for teachers and students in school. "We need clean water to drink, wash our bowls and chopsticks after lunch, flush the toilets and wash our hands. We cannot do these if there is no water." Besides that, carrying water when it is raining may also cause falls and other injuries to happen. Everyone hopes they can access clean water in their school as soon as possible

In March 2021, a collaboration between World Vision and the school saw clean water finally gushed out of the taps! "We do not have to collect water from the well and risk being injured anymore. We spend more time studying and our results are improving. Our personal hygiene is also better and we do not fall sick so easily now. I hope we can continue to use this clean tap water!" says Yang happily.

Besides helping the school to install water pipes, World Vision also conducts handwashing activities in schools and communities, so that children learn to wash their hands correctly. This prevents them from contracting diarrhea or pneumonia and helps improve their health condition.

Yang's is more attentive about hygiene and sanitation after attending the activities, "We wash our hands before we eat, after we use the toilet and after we play with our friends. Washing our hands is very important. If I keep my hands clean, I will not have stomach pains and diarrhea, and I will become stronger. I also watched on television about the importance of handwashing to prevent the coronavirus."

Clean water is the building block of good health. It is vital and has lasting effects on a child's growth and development. Let us protect every child's right to use clean drinking water.

Our Achievements in 2021 Disability Inclusion



World Vision works with local partners to provide quality rehabilitation, education and social work services for children with disabilities, as well as provide support and trainings to strengthen the capabilities of caregivers. We also promote the set up of barrier-free environments and inclusion of children with disabilities in decision-making processes. This enhances their participation, development and social integration.

In 2021, World Vision carried out Disability Inclusion projects in Shaanxi, Tianjin, Guangxi which have impacted the lives of **4,031** people.



As this poem is read, the scenery of the riverside jumps out before one's eyes. Can you imagine this was written by a child who has never seen the colors of this world before? Meet 12-year-old girl Bing, she was born with a visual impairment since birth.


When Bing studied in a special education school, most of her needs were taken care by caregivers in the school. She did not learn to perform many daily chores independently.

Several years later, the school moved away from the city, and so Bing began attending a social service center supported by World Vision. The social workers designed a learning plan for Bing so that she can take care of herself, and also build her self-confidence. They helped her to practice orientation and mobility skills, learn self-care skills, Braille, Chinese and Mathematics. All these skills would build a strong foundation when she attends compulsory education after leaving the center.

To further support Bing, social workers enrolled Bing to attend a regular school for three-months. With constant support and encouragement from social workers and teachers, Bing was able to perform very well in her studies. Not only is she able to throw herself freely into her world of poetry, but also in her daily life. She has transformed into a happy, independent and outgoing child.

"I want to be a kindergarten teacher when I grow up. I sometimes help my friends with mathematic problems at the center, and I teach my siblings when I am at home."

Our Achievements in 2021 Relief and Rehabilitation



Relief work

Henan was hit by a rare flood disaster at the end of July of 2021. With the support from the Overseas NGO Management Office of Tianjin's Public Security Bureau, China Association for Disaster Prevention, Pingdingshan Volunteers Association and SF Express, we were able to mobilize **125** shelter tents worth **CNY 1 million** to Xingyang City, to provide temporary shelter for **2,400** people as well as frontline workers who were working to prevent the spread of the pandemic.

Disaster prevention

World Vision conducts disaster reduction trainings and drills for local NGOs and communities, provide safety equipment and work with communities to draw up disaster preparedness plans. This strengthens their disaster prevention capacity, and prepares them to respond to emergencies.

In 2021, World Vision supported drill exercises, the preparation of disaster prevention plans and equipped **31,076** people and their communities with enhanced disaster reduction abilities in Shaanxi, Tianjin, Guizhou and Jiangxi.



10-year-old Zheng and his companions came to the village committee square one Saturday morning to take part in a disaster prevention and reduction exercise. By playing the "safety chess" game, Zheng and his friends learned new information about disaster prevention and reduction. They also took part in a competition to test their knowledge and this helped strengthen their understanding about the subjects. Such exercises enable children to gain

practical experience on how to prevent or reduce disasters from happening. At the end of the day, everyone was excited to share what they learned. Zheng (second from left) said, "This is my first time extinguishing a fire with water, it is actually very simple. Although I am young, but I was brave and tried to stop the disaster, even though was just a drill. A disaster can happen anytime, I learned that prevention is the key."

COVID-19 Response

Since the COVID-19 pandemic broke out globally in 2020, World Vision is working to prevent the spread of the coronavirus and reduce its impact on vulnerable children and families in more than **70** countries and regions with **US\$350 million**.

Our global strategic objectives:

1. Scale up preventative measures to limit the spread of disease
2. Strengthen health systems and workers
3. Support children affected by COVID-19 with education, child protection, food security, and livelihoods
4. Collaborate and advocate to ensure vulnerable children are protected

Although China has overcome the most critical period in its fight against COVID-19, sporadic outbreaks continue to happen throughout 2021 and we cannot let our guards down yet. To help prevent the spread of the virus, World Vision China distributed masks and family packs in communities in need, promoted good personal hygiene practices, supported trainings about child protection, mental health, case management and other topics. In 2021, our response directly impacted the lives of **212,728** people.

Distributed **574** family packs

Distributed **93,374** masks

Equipped **5,321** people to cultivate good personal hygiene practices

Equipped **48,678** people with knowledge about mental health, psychosocial support and child protection during an emergency

Child-friendly Rural Revitalization Project

In step with the national rural revitalization strategy, World Vision supports the development of new talent and management capabilities to operate tourism activities such as the promotion of ecological living, local customs and trades in rural areas.

The project is carried out in Yunnan, Guizhou, Guangxi and Shaanxi, and includes work in revitalizing rural areas, improving the communities' living environments and access to safe drinking water, as well as developing child protection systems at the community level.

With guidance from the Kunming Bureau of Agriculture and Rural Affairs and China Agricultural University, World Vision was able to support and work with two Kunming-based social organizations to carry out "Child-friendly Rural Revitalization" project in two rural villages in Yunnan.

The villagers and local staff plan parent-and-child, nature themed family tours which highlights their local wildlife and cultural features, providing city-based families a unique countryside experience.

Ending Domestic Violence Against Children

“Battle of the Dads”

This year, World Vision joined forces with artists Timmy Hung, G.E.M. Gloria Tang Tsz Kei and corporates such as Mentholatum (Asia Pacific) Limited and Asiaray Media Group to launch the “Battle of the Dads” online awareness campaign.

The campaign aimed to help fathers understand their role in children’s education and encourage their involvement in the different stages of growth and development through parent-and-child activities and the sharing of parenting skills and experiences. This is to promote harmony in families and improve the protection of children so that they can grow in a healthy environment.

World Vision collaborated with Shaanxi Research Association for Women and Family, Shaanxi Social Work Association and Nanchang Yi Xin Yi Yi Service Ceter (南昌益心意益公益服务中心) to organize projects for social workers in Shaanxi and Jiangxi to build their capacity to address domestic violence. The trainings helped improved their understanding about child protection and also their ability to provide professional services. Some of them then organized “zero violence” awareness activities in the communities they serve, reaching **1,330** people in total.

World Vision also worked with schools, village committees and volunteers to implement positive parenting and parent-and-child activities. This is to encourage better communication between parents and children and to build a “zero tolerance for violence” environment.

World Vision’s 20 years in Shaanxi

In 2000, World Vision set up an office in Xi’an City, Shaanxi Province, and until 2020, World Vision has operated in Shaanxi for 20 years.

To commemorate World Vision’s work in Shaanxi for the past 20 years, on the 14 April 2021, World Vision was joined by the Honorary President of Shaanxi Charity Association, Mr. Xu Shanlin, President, Mr. Wu Qianjin, Vice Chairman, Mr. Su Xinquan and his team, and also the Dean of China Public Welfare Research Institute of Beijing Normal University, Mr. Wang Zhen, to celebrate this occasions. The event was also attended by representatives from various charity associations of the municipal, district and county levels, social organizations and project beneficiaries of Shaanxi province.

Under the guidance and support of Shaanxi Charity Federation and various government departments, World Vision worked closely with the local government, social organizations and communities to carry out relief and rehabilitation, education, child protection, child well-being for vulnerable children, health and sustainable livelihood work. These projects have brought change and contributed to well-being of vulnerable children, their families and local communities for the past two decades.

Growing up and chasing dreams together

Achieving child-focused community development in Du'an and Jinxiu (Guangxi), Baihe (Shaanxi) and Pingquan (Hebei)



Guangxi is a mountainous region and many villages are located among these mountains. Travelling and going to school used to be difficult for villagers and children here. World Vision provided funding support to dig a tunnel after hearing the challenges faced by the community. After years of hard work, a long tunnel was finally completed. This tunnel has greatly reduces the distance children have to walk to reach their school, and also allows the local community to easily reach areas outside of their villages.

At the beginning of the 21st century, World Vision with the support of local governments, started child-focused Area Programs in different regions. These projects aim to build safe, healthy and friendly environments that support the well-being of children, and also work alongside communities to help them achieve sustainable development.





