Global generosity and strong local support have enabled World Vision China to serve vulnerable children for decades, helping children, families, and communities build brighter futures.

In 2025, World Vision China implemented 34 projects, reaching 197,898 children and their families. We supported 140,000 children to grow up in safer, more child-friendly environments; helped nearly 20,000 people gain improved access to safe water and sanitation; partnered with universities to develop practical interventions to prevent unintentional child injuries; and shared our long-term experience to support the development of child-friendly communities.

World Vision remains steadfastly child-centered. Each year, we listen to children and strengthen their voices across our programs. We believe every child's idea is a seed — and when met with listening and action, it can take root and grow. In the year ahead, we will further deepen meaningful child participation, ensuring children's voices help drive lasting, positive change.

On behalf of World Vision, I sincerely thank the children and communities we serve, our supporters, local partners, government departments, and our dedicated staff. Your support enables us to continue our mission of helping every child experience life in all its fullness.

WE ARE WORLD VISION

World Vision is a child-focused relief, development and advocacy organization.

Founded in 1950, it works to build a world where every girl and boy enjoys good health, experiences love, and is educated, cared for, protected, and able to participate. For 75 years, World Vision has focused on the most vulnerable children so they may experience life in all its fullness.

The organization operates in nearly 100 countries and regions, with more than 33,000 staff working alongside governments, civil society organizations, businesses, academic institutions, donors, and volunteers to deliver sustainable programs that create lasting change.

Our **child-centered** approach ensures programs **respond to children's needs and safeguard their rights**.

World Vision's work in the Chinese Mainland began in 1982 in response to the Qinghai floods. In 1993, World Vision China was officially established to advance community development and humanitarian programs, serving left-behind children, migrant children, children with disabilities, and those affected by disasters.

This year, World Vision China invested **CNY 39,531,734** (USD 5,526,433) in its programs, with nearly 90% funded by monthly donations from Hong Kong and Macau.

Together with our partners, we reached **197,898 children and their families** by **strengthening child protection systems, promoting early childhood development, advancing disability inclusion, enhancing disaster risk management, improving access to safe water, and reducing child injuries**.

CHILD PROTECTION & DEVELOPMENT

World Vision is committed to building support systems among children, families, and communities. By strengthening children's life skills, enhancing caregivers' child protection awareness, and improving child protection systems, we aim to help children grow up in caring and protective environments.

We continue to **promote child participation, build child-friendly communities, and strengthen child protection systems.** We focus on family- and community-based support, listening to children's voices, improving infrastructure, and enhancing service capacity to build a comprehensive system that emphasizes both prevention and response. The goal is to create a sustainable safety net for children, especially highly vulnerable groups such as children affected by migration.

In 2025, our child protection and development program directly reached **167,288** children and adults.

Key program outcomes include:



16,460 children received social work services and life skills training, helping create safer and better environments for their growth



3,530 young children received improved early childhood development services and support



Child protection capacity was strengthened through **24,209 participations** by child protection practitioners



3,601 caregivers participated in training on positive parenting, early childhood education, and related topics



Enhancing Children's Participation

In 2025, World Vision continued to promote meaningful participation of children. Through children's groups, we strengthened their capacities and encouraged their active involvement in project design and evaluation, community environment improvement, service enhancement, and support for vulnerable groups. These efforts strengthened children's sense of belonging and ownership within their communities, built essential life skills, and helped ensure projects responded more effectively to their needs.

Building Child-Friendly Communities

World Vision promoted child-friendly community models across project locations, creating safe public spaces and integrated services for children ages 0–17.

The *Building a Home Together* project renovated children’s activity spaces in Shaanxi, Guizhou, Jiangxi, and Yunnan, while delivering early childhood development and life skills training to children and their families. The project enhanced migrant children’s sense of belonging and provided support for their growth, establishing a replicable model that was recognized as an exemplary case under Shaanxi’s child-friendly city initiative.

Since 2022, World Vision has supported social work stations in resettlement communities in Guizhou. Over the past three years, the project has served 3,016 residents, strengthening children’s sense of belonging, life skills, and participation, while enhancing caregivers’ awareness of child protection and fostering a more supportive community environment.

When I learned this year that my parents are closing our shop and returning to our hometown, I felt very sad. I’ve lived here for seven years, and the Children’s Center has been a big part of my childhood. Here, I met my two best friends, Xiaoli and Xiaohan. We joined activities, watched movies, explored the city, and became junior mentors, organizing activities for other children. Although I’m leaving, I’ve learned to be brave and confident, and I’ve made true friends. You helped me believe I can do better.”

Child-friendly community project



We support local social organizations in strengthening their capacity to serve children and help transfer core knowledge and skills to frontline community workers, providing technical support for child-friendly community development.

Strengthening Child Protection Systems

World Vision strengthened child protection systems by providing capacity support for children, families, and communities.

The program delivered life skills training for children, focusing on emotional management, interpersonal communication, and self-protection to help them recognize and respond to risks. Guided by early childhood development and positive parenting principles, the program strengthened protective support within families. Training was also provided for frontline community child protection workers to improve risk identification, psychological support, and referral services. At the community level, multi-sector child protection response mechanisms were strengthened.

The *Go Baby Go* project followed national early childhood development guidelines and was implemented through community child health service systems. It supported caregivers with risk assessment and nurturing guidance, strengthened early risk detection, and helped ensure children in need could access professional support.



We support kindergartens in creating child-friendly reading spaces and to organize engaging activities—such as role-play, reading challenges, storytelling, and immersive sessions—to help children and parents develop a love for reading and build lasting habits that support holistic development.



In the past, we often intervened only after children had already been harmed. Since joining this program, with home visits and support from mothers in the community, our work has shifted toward earlier prevention. Recently, a young mother became overwhelmed by her child's persistent crying, the project team provided counselling and alerted us, enabling early risk identification. This prevention-first approach makes child protection part of everyday practice.”

At the launch of the new *Celebrating Families* project this year, staff members' children engaged in thoughtful discussions about their ideal family environments. The project aims to address root causes of risks such as school dropout, violence, and harmful behaviors by supporting families to build relationships and foster greater harmony.

Shy Eyes That Began to Shine

"I first noticed him when a pair of shy eyes peeked out from behind the door during an activity at the Children's Center," the project social worker recalled.

Xiaowu's family had recently relocated to the county town under the resettlement policy. When his father lost his job as a casual labor, the family of five began relying on subsistence allowances.

Through home visits, the social worker learned that concerns about neighbourhood safety had led the father to keep his four children indoors. With limited parental engagement and little peer interaction, Xiaowu became increasingly withdrawn.

The social worker invited him to join activities at the Children's Center. With consistent encouragement, he slowly opened up—moving from watching silently in a corner to participating, and eventually initiating conversations with other children.



Now 13, Xiaowu has grown into a confident and outgoing young boy. Together with his younger brother, they took part in the Children's Center's *Cherish Life, Prevent Drowning* safety awareness activity.

At the same time, support extended to the family. During home visits, the social worker worked alongside Xiaowu and his brother to clean and organize their home, helping create a healthier and more orderly living environment. The two boys were encouraged to take on age-appropriate household responsibilities to ease their father's caregiving burden. When financial constraints meant Xiaowu had no extracurricular books, storybooks suited to his age were provided to nurture his interest in reading and learning.

The social worker also encouraged his father to become more involved by helping him see how much Xiaowu cared about him. Wanting to support his children's growth, the father began participating in positive parenting and child protection sessions. After the training, he started asking Xiaowu whether he enjoyed his time at the Children's Center and spent more time with him doing puzzles and drawing.

The father was also connected to vocational training opportunities. After learning electrical skills, he secured more stable work, helping improve the family's livelihood.

Today, the family table is a place not only for warm meals, but also for conversation and laughter.

Now, when Xiaowu walks into the Children's Center, he no longer hides behind the door. He arrives with a bright smile and a confident greeting: "Teacher, I'm here again!"

HEALTH, WATER & SANITATION

World Vision remains committed to improving children's health and hygiene by **enhancing water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) conditions and preventing child unintentional injuries.**

In 2025, our program directly reached **20,667** children and adults.

Key program outcomes include:



7,524 people gained access to reliable and clean drinking water in homes and schools.



8,027 children gained access to cleaner sanitation facilities, including toilets, shower areas, and handwashing stations



2,696 children joined health education activities, including handwashing and common childhood disease prevention



The injury prevention knowledge and capacity of **1,143 caregivers and child service providers** were strengthened



Child Unintentional Injury Prevention

In 2025, the *HaiZi* project made further progress in reducing child unintentional injuries in western China. The project is supported by the European Union, World Vision Netherlands, and World Vision Hong Kong, and implemented by World Vision China and Safe Kids Worldwide (China).

This year, the project partnered with the Shanghai Jing'an Huatong Injury Prevention Research and Information Consulting Center (Safe Kids Worldwide (China)) to co-organize an in-person attendance and livestream hybrid forum on child injury intervention services. The event invited child safety experts and scholars, and engaged over 140 staff from nearly 100 child service institutions and enterprises to promote cross-sector dialogue and knowledge sharing for child protection. The project also provided organizational management training for 122 social workers from 68 civil society organizations to improve service delivery for children.

An online photography activity was conducted to raise awareness about home environment injury risks among children and caregivers.

The project research on child injury prevention was published in *BMJ Open* and *Frontiers in Public Health*. Building on these studies, the project conducted effectiveness research on the Child Safety Operational Procedure (CSO-U-Inj-SOP) to provide evidence-based guidance for child injury prevention practices.

Water & Sanitation

World Vision improved rural drinking water, hygiene, and sanitation in communities and schools in 2025, helping children, families, and communities better prevent waterborne diseases and infections.

The project supported five villages in Guizhou and Yunnan to implement the Rural Drinking Water Safety Plan, developed with the Chinese Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Piped water systems and village-level operation and maintenance plans were established, strengthening community management and improving water supply resilience under climate stresses such as drought.

The project also piloted an innovative model in Guizhou by integrating WASH interventions with the primary healthcare system. By supporting rural medical facility infrastructure and promoting preventive measures against childhood diseases such as diarrhea and pneumonia, the project linked water quality management with grassroots health services, improving disease prevention and early response capacity in rural areas.

Goodbye to the “mushroom squat”

Ten-year-old Xiaoling lives in a mountain village and walks to school with her younger brother every day. School is her favourite place—she learns new knowledge in class and enjoys playing with classmates in the playground, where World Vision helped install child-friendly soft-padded flooring.

For years, however, the school had only two low water taps. After sports activities or meals, children had to huddle and squat around the taps to wait for water—under strong sunlight or in the rain—jostling for space to wash their hands or dishes.

World Vision partnered with the school and a corporate supporter to build age-appropriate handwashing stations for both senior and junior students. New water taps were installed, together with basins, towels, and soap. A canopy was added to protect children from sun and rain, and the washing area was decorated with cartoon-themed tiles to create a more welcoming and child-friendly environment.

“Now there are more taps. After playing basketball, we don’t need to rush to wash our hands, and at lunch we can eat slowly without worrying about competing for a washing spot,” Xiaoling said happily.

The children also said goodbye to the “mushroom squat”. They can now wash their hands and dishes more comfortably, enjoying cleaner water, better hygiene, and a more joyful childhood.

DISABILITY INCLUSION

World Vision's disability inclusion program **focuses on children with disabilities who are most in need**. Guided by a child-centered approach, we promote holistic development and disability inclusion in partnership with government departments, rehabilitation centers, special education schools, and civil society organizations in the areas of rehabilitation, education, and social work. The program aims to improve the accessibility and effectiveness of services in under-resourced areas, while promoting children's full, equal, and meaningful participation in society.

In 2025, our disability inclusion program directly reached **14,090** children and adults.

Key program outcomes include:



1,227 children received quality rehabilitation, education, and social services



Sex education workshops recorded **626 caregiver participations and 1,170 children participations**



Caregiver capacity was strengthened, with **3,299 caregiver participations** benefiting from training to care for children with disabilities.



7,289 people participated in activities, increasing awareness and recognition of the rights and needs of children with disabilities

The Community for All project continued supporting the most vulnerable children by building a comprehensive support system in under-resourced counties, covering child empowerment, family support, rehabilitation, education, social work, and social inclusion.

The project provided home-based support for children with severe disabilities and children not covered by welfare policies. It also promoted inclusive early childhood education and offered youths career preparation, vocational training, and opportunities for decision-making and peer interaction.

In 2025, we established 14 youth groups, supporting 173 adolescents to participate in group management, decision making, and promote mutual help and inclusion.



Therapists provided home-based therapy for rural children with disabilities, including assessment, rehabilitation training, and daily living skills development.



We support vocational and skills training to help youth with disabilities explore and identify their career paths and better prepare for social participation.

The Sex Education for Children with Disabilities project supported 226 teachers, social workers, and child welfare practitioners to receive training and obtain their Foundation Certificate in Sex Education. We promoted the integration of age-appropriate sex education into rehabilitation classes and social practice activities within partner agencies, enhancing children’s self-care and self-protection skills.

We also strengthened caregivers’ understanding of sex education and their capacity to guide children.

Our partners also adopted diverse approaches—including community-based activities, short educational videos on WeChat, and thematic posters—to help raise public awareness of the needs of children with disabilities.



After 22 years of operation, the **Prince of Peace Children’s Home initiative in Wuqing, Tianjin** concluded successfully.

The project was a collaboration between the Wuqing Civil Affairs Bureau, the POP’s Foundation, and World Vision. It supported quality care and rehabilitation services, improved service standards, and hosted over 300 domestic and international interns to raise awareness of children with disabilities.

With strengthened community support, 227 children benefited from improved rehabilitation care, greater independence, and a better quality of life.

Soaring Toward the Future

Xiaohua attends a special education school in the county town. As graduation nears, his mother feels anxious and uncertain. "My son will soon enter society. We don't know what he will be able to do in two or three years, or whether he will manage well," she said.

This year, his school partnered with World Vision to introduce sex education classes. The course helps students understand adolescence, practise self-protection, and develop appropriate social boundaries.

A teacher shared, "Xiaohua is going through puberty. In the past, he often stood very close to girls. After the classes, he began to understand the changes in his body and learned to keep appropriate distance."

The project also brought in instructors to provide vocational training in baking and car washing, giving his mother greater reassurance. "From the photos his teachers shared, I saw how well he was doing and felt very proud. At a Disability Day event, he



performed and helped run a food booth. It gave me more confidence about his future."

Xiaohua shared, "I enjoy these activities. Our teachers take us to the supermarket and to restaurants to practise dining skills. I feel very happy."

With the right support and opportunities to learn and gain experience, children with disabilities can be independent, spread their wings and soar toward a future full of possibility.

Safer Communities Through Preparedness

The *Strengthening Community Resilience to Disasters* project (2022–2025) was implemented in 17 communities across Jiangxi, Tianjin, and Guizhou.

The project supported the formation of emergency volunteer teams, established relief supply storage points, and updated community response plans. Disaster simulation facilities—including a VR-equipped experience room—were introduced to enhance practical learning. Households were encouraged to prepare emergency kits through public awareness activities. In total, 6,094 people, including 2,521 children, improved their disaster preparedness.

316 staff from 54 organizations also received training, mentoring, and knowledge-sharing.

By mobilizing local resources, using technology, and promoting children's participation, the project improved community resilience, including project vulnerable groups.

DISASTER RELIEF & RISK REDUCTION

World Vision's relief and disaster risk reduction program responds to the urgent needs of disaster-affected populations while promoting disaster preparedness, especially among children. Through the provision of resources and disaster risk education, the program strengthens community response and recovery capacity.

Flood Response

In summer 2024, flooding in southeastern China affected over 2.36 million people, damaging homes, farms, and infrastructure. By December, families were relying on assistance while working to restore their farmland.

World Vision received CNY 3.01 million (USD 460,237) from the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Government. In partnership with local charity associations in Xiushui County and Poyang County, 232,500 kg of rice and family kits were distributed to 7,750 families. Follow-up assessments were conducted in early 2025 to ensure that assistance met beneficiaries' needs.



Ms. Huang said, "Our farm near the reservoir was flooded and covered by sand and debris. We lost this year's harvest and can only replant next year. Today I received two bags of rice and items such as a blanket, wok, and towels. The rice will feed our family for some time, and the blanket looks very warm. Receiving these care packages makes us feel comforted."

More Care, Greater Impact

World Vision continues to mobilize broader resources and partnerships to scale impact and ensure support reaches children and communities most in need.

Lighting the Way for Children

In March 2025, World Vision hosted a fundraising dinner in Hong Kong. An exhibition showcased our programs, while frontline staff shared firsthand field stories. The event brought together cross-sector supporters to respond to the urgent needs of vulnerable children in the Chinese Mainland and strengthen support for their future.



Prof. Patrick Nip, Vice Board Chair of World Vision China, emphasized that collective efforts across society can bring tangible hope to the most vulnerable children and change their future.



A student shared, "This experience has been meaningful and inspiring. We hope to have more opportunities to contribute to children's growth and development."

Compassion in Practice

From July to August 2025, we partnered with 23 faculty members and students from the School of Nursing at Hong Kong Metropolitan University for a two-week service-learning program in Suichuan and Nanchang, Jiangxi. Using their professional skills, they supported local children's development. Students called it a "once-in-a-lifetime journey" that deepened their commitment as future healthcare professionals.

Love in Action

The Shanghai Fraternity Association of Hong Kong is a well-known charitable organization that has long supported vulnerable groups. With a strong focus on children, the Association supported the *Child Friendly Community* project for migrant children in Nanchang, Jiangxi, helping create safe spaces for children to learn and interact. We are truly grateful for the Association's trust and support.



The Shanghai Fraternity Association recognized the quality and impact of World Vision's programs supporting children in the Chinese Mainland, particularly those affected by migration.




